The knowledge of organization structure and proper record of delegation of authorities within the Institution are prerequisites of Management Information System. Infrastructure Maintenance Registers are digitalized and it maintained through software and server. The ERP package consists of Online Admission Module, Online Fee Payment Module, Attendance entry, and Continuous Internal Assessment Mark entry system, ecirculars and Examination Information System, Students' Feedback, Staff Profile Module. The institution has its own servers to store and retrieve relevant data pertaining to Academic and Administrative processes. Management Information System is adopted for the creation of student and staff database and other managerial practices. Infrastructure and academic requirements are collected every year and the information is stored in the college data base. The academic facilities and practices adopted by the

experienced institutions are viewed in websites and suitably adopted for planning and development of the infrastructure and academic practices. A Virtual classroom is a teaching and learning environment where participants can interact, communicate, view and discuss presentations and engage with learning resources while working in groups, all in an online setting. The Active Inspire software is used in teaching methods it is an application which helps in keep the class more active by supporting even offline services. Most of the lessons and topics by Lecturers were posted in the Google classroom via Active Inspire software which helps in converting into feasible format according to the student's gadgets configuration. Therefore, the notes and materials are available in multiple eresources. This also gives an interactive session with the students in making them more participative. The IQAC cell framed a procedure to maintain the class timetable, course plan, laboratory plan, notes of lesson maintained by individual faculty in the form of enotes. It also enables students to learn beyond curriculum an advanced learning in the subjects of their own interest.]

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and scheduled the allotted time on the basis of quantum of course content, which is duly given in the academic calendar as scheduled dates of commencement and completion of academic session, submission of assignment and cycle tests. Planning Schedule to the academic year, and Workload is prepared in each department by conducting department meeting based on staff council meeting, IQAC meeting and handbook and submitted to the Principal through the Head of the Departments. Required number of faculties are appointed in accordance with the Workload for effective completion of the curriculum in time. The subjects allocated to the faculties by the HoD's based on Subject specialization/preferences obtained from the faculties as well as their domain of expertise and the same submitted to the Principal for the approval. Based on the Subject allocation, Time table will be prepared and circulated to the faculties and students and uploaded in ERP for effective communication. The lesson plan is prepared by the faculty members as per the time table and handbook for effective curriculum delivery and the same is submitted to the

Principal after monitored by HoD. Bridge course is conducted for first year Under Graduate students in order to bridge the knowledge gap of the students. Faculties prepares material for their respective courses in the form of handouts, PPT, word and pdf files and circulated to the students through e-mail and ERP for the betterment of the students. Besides conventional methods, Faculties follow ICT enabled teaching methodologies like power point presentation, video lectures, e-content, ICT Digital libraries, NPTEL resources etc., so as to equip the students with the necessary skills. Class tests are conducted frequently to enhance the learning outcome. Assignments, seminars, group Discussion, cycle tests are the primary activities for the students to assess their internal marks. Regular Attendance, Cycle Test Marks are monitored and the report intimated to the parent through Profile Card. All the registers are maintained in the department after getting signature from the class incharges, HoD's and the Principal. Tutorial Ward System is followed in all the departments for the effective monitoring of the performance. Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners. Advanced learners are motivated to apply for NPTEL/MOOC online certificate courses under SWAYAM. Glossaries are prepared by the Departments which help the students to get familiarized with technical terms. 24 hours internet facility available in our Institution to upgrade the knowledge of the students and faculties. Library facility is extended to the students and library hours are facilitated. Guest Lectures, Seminars, Conferences, Workshops/Hands on Trainings, Quiz Competitions, Skill Development Programs etc., are organized to enhance the knowledge of the students. Faculty Development Programs are conducted frequently to enrich the faculties. Faculties and Students are encouraged to attend various Seminars, Conferences and Refresher Courses etc., to get the exposure. More number of MoU's signed and functioned with industry, institution, hospitals, research centres to motivate the research activities.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, Mentors of this college needs to render equitable and dedicated service to help mentees as the college is located in rural and economical backward area. Mentor responsibilities are to support mentees who are enrolled on a course of study with good communication, sympathetic approach and confidentiality. One of the most effective systems functioning in the institution that bridges the gap between the student and faculty is the tutor (mentor) ward system. Each faculty member is assigned with maximum of 30 students as their wards. Every academic year mentor is assigned and restructured. Tutor ward meetings are conducted regularly to get the feedback from students about academic activities and their grievances. Tutor-ward meeting is being conducted once in 15 days and record the minutes. The minutes of the meeting will be reviewed by the HOD in the department meeting along with the faculty members, suitable action is initiated and recorded. Action required at the institution level will be placed in HoD's meeting which is chaired by Principal. Towards the middle of the march-2020 the responsibilities of mentors doubled owing to the spread of deadly pandemic. To help students to get connected to the college environment which includes teaching and non-teaching staffs, library reading room and laboratory facilities available Help mentees to plan and prioritize work, Every mentor is required to create a data base, including names, register numbers, phone numbers and Email ID's of their respective mentees Mentors took up additional responsibilities of providing information about online classes, study materials (Both hard and soft copy), examinations etc., During the Covid -19 pandemic period, the Mentor- Mentee system effectively functioned through online mode with the following activities such as tutor ward meetings: • Review of attendance • Students Behavioral monitoring • Marks obtained in Continuous Internal Assessments • Internal Marks • Learning difficulties • Teaching materials posted in Google classroom • Assignments and component submissions • Lessons covered in each subject • Extra coaching classes on need basis • Students Achievements. Apart from this, the tutor meets the students individually in regular intervals to have better understanding on their wards. The tutor also verifies weekly / fortnightly lessons covered by faculty and if

necessary give suitable advice to handle extra classes in assisting the slow learners. Tutorials and continuous assessment are used to identify students' with learning difficulties and special attention in order to focus on all students to keep them abreast on the studies through support services and bridge courses. For Slow learners with difficulties in understanding and learning the students are paid individual attention, guidance and trained by the tutor in better ways of learning. Tutor ward system is not only for academically weaker section of the students with problems and issues but also focus towards motivating the performing students to aim high regarding, Effort towards motivating them to get ranks, Students are motivated to participate in academic competitions and get prizes, Encouraged to take part in Research Activities.

The institution is one of the affiliated colleges of the Bharathidasan University, Thiruchirappalli. So the institution follows the guidelines prescribed by the parent University. Choice Based Credit system (CBSE) is

During the Lockdown following Covid-19 Pandemic, Online Assignments were taken from the students. Group Discussion At least one Group Discussion per semester is conducted on an important selected topic. It is monitored bythe concerned faculty.
